YAKIMA VALLEY (WASHINGTON)

Yakima Valley, established in 1983 as Washington's first federally recognized AVA, lies within the larger Columbia Valley and is home to many historic vineyards that supply fruit to renowned Washington wineries. Warm days, cool nights, and diverse soils create ideal conditions for balanced wines with vibrant acidity and expressive fruit. In this high-desert climate, irrigation from the Yakima River allows growers to carefully control water, helping concentrate flavors and maintain vine balance.

L'ECOLE NO. 41 SÉMILLON

- **Region:** Yakima Valley, Washington
 - **Winery:** Founded in 1983 and housed in a historic Frenchtown schoolhouse built in 1915, L'Ecole No. 41, meaning "School No. 41" in French, is one of Washington's most respected family-owned wineries, known for producing elegant wines that reflect the character of Washington vineyards.
 - **Varietal:** Sémillon
 - **Winemaker Notes:** This wine displays bright aromas of lemon zest, white peach, and fresh herbs. The palate is crisp and textured, offering notes of citrus, green apple, and subtle minerality with balanced acidity and a clean, refreshing finish.
 - **Aging Process:** Fermented in stainless steel to preserve freshness and varietal purity.
 - **Pairings:** Shellfish, seafood, salads, goat cheese, roasted vegetables, or light poultry dishes.
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RED MOUNTAIN AVA (WASHINGTON)

Red Mountain is one of Washington's most distinctive and sought-after wine regions. With intense sun exposure, warm temperatures, and well-drained soils, the AVA produces structured wines with concentrated fruit and firm tannins. Despite its small size, Red Mountain has gained international recognition for powerful yet balanced red wines.

HEDGES FAMILY ESTATE RED BLEND

- **Region:** Red Mountain AVA, Washington
- **Winery:** Hedges Family Estate is a pioneering winery on Red Mountain and a leader in sustainable and biodynamic farming. Founded in 1987, the winery is known for producing structured, age-worthy wines that showcase the intensity and character of Red Mountain vineyards.
- **Varietals:** Bordeaux-style red blend
- **Winemaker Notes:** Deep ruby in color, this wine opens with aromas of dark cherry, blackberry, and subtle spice. The palate is rich and layered with notes of black fruit, cocoa, and cedar, supported by firm tannins and balanced acidity leading to a long, elegant finish.
- **Aging Process:** Aged in oak barrels to add complexity and structure.
- **Pairings:** Grilled steak, roasted lamb, braised short ribs, or hearty mushroom dishes.

COLUMBIA VALLEY (WASHINGTON)

The Columbia Valley AVA covers about one-third of Washington and produces the majority of the state's wine grapes. Eastern Washington is a high desert, receiving only 6–8 inches of rain annually, so vineyards rely on irrigation from the Columbia River and its tributaries. Warm, sunny days, cool nights, and a long growing season allow grapes to ripen fully while maintaining natural acidity, producing balanced wines with rich fruit and refined structure.

JANUIK WINERY MERLOT

- **Region:** Columbia Valley, Washington
 - **Winery:** Mike Januik is one of Washington's most influential winemakers. Before founding Januik Winery, he spent more than 20 years as head winemaker at Chateau Ste. Michelle, Washington's oldest winery and a key force in establishing the state's reputation for world-class wines. Based in Woodinville, Januik Winery crafts balanced, elegant wines that highlight the purity of Columbia Valley fruit, sourcing grapes from some of Washington's most respected vineyards.
 - **Varietals:** Merlot
 - **Winemaker Notes:** Aromas of ripe plum, black cherry, and subtle baking spice lead into a smooth, approachable palate. Flavors of dark fruit, cocoa, and soft tannins create a balanced wine with a round mouthfeel and lingering finish.
 - **Aging Process:** Aged in oak barrels to enhance depth and complexity.
 - **Pairings:** Roast chicken, grilled pork, pasta with tomato-based sauces, or mild cheeses.
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WALLA WALLA VALLEY (WASHINGTON)

Walla Walla Valley is one of Washington's most celebrated wine regions, known for producing complex and expressive wines with both power and elegance. The name "Walla Walla" comes from a Native American term meaning "many waters," referring to the region's rivers that historically supported agriculture. Although the AVA was established in 1984, it quickly rose to prominence and is now particularly known for Syrah, Cabernet Sauvignon, and Merlot, which thrive in the valley's warm days, cool nights, and well-drained soils.

SAVIAH CELLARS SYRAH

- **Region:** Walla Walla Valley, Washington
- **Winery:** Founded in 2000 by winemaker Richard Funk, Saviah Cellars focuses on crafting wines that reflect the unique character of Walla Walla Valley vineyards. The winery is known for producing balanced, expressive wines with a strong sense of place and for working with some of the region's top vineyards. The name "Saviah" comes from the founder's children, Savannah and Isaiah. Saviah is particularly respected for Rhône-style wines, especially Syrah.
- **Varietals:** Syrah
- **Winemaker Notes:** This Syrah offers aromas of blackberry, plum, and cracked pepper. The palate is rich and savory with flavors of dark fruit, olive, and spice, supported by smooth tannins and balanced acidity that lead to a long, elegant finish.
- **Aging Process:** Aged in oak barrels to develop complexity and structure.
- **Pairings:** Grilled meats, roasted vegetables, lamb, or hearty stews.
